What a year! While I know I do not have to remind everyone of the epic year of 2020, I am so pleased to share our 2020 Annual Report. We are so grateful to you, our donors, advocates and other supporters, who remained loyal and devoted to our mission during the pandemic. Your commitment helped Mission Kids through this trying and difficult time and allowed us to continue to serve the children of Montgomery County.

We are so proud of the Mission Kids staff and leadership, and we want to thank them for their dedication and hard work. After the news received on March 12, 2020, Mission Kids immediately jumped into action and began to design a plan to continue to provide hope and healing for our clients despite a global pandemic. By March 16, Mission Kids had distributed its first written Guidelines of Operation During COVID-19 Pandemic. Mission Kids regularly met with multidisciplinary team members to develop safe, virtual forensic interviewing techniques so we could continue to serve our clients and respond to child abuse allegations while ensuring staff, multidisciplinary team members, children and their families remained safe and healthy. Mission Kids took the lead in Pennsylvania on developing protocols for how to continue operating safely, discuss safety planning, conduct virtual forensic interviews and telehealth therapy, and work remotely with staff and directors across the state.

Although many things halted, Mission Kids continued to grow during the pandemic by adding another Trauma Therapist, a Family Advocate, a third Forensic Interviewer and an additional full-time Community Prevention Educator.

Thanks to Zoom, in 2020 alone, our prevention education team continued its outreach and reached more than 5,000 children, adults, educators, and so many more through ROAR, Darkness to Light and Child Abuse and Trauma-informed Classroom Workshops.

Abbie Newman, R.N., J.D., our fearless leader, was recognized in the Philadelphia Business Journal as one of 2020's Most Admired CEOs and in Main Line Today as one of the magazine's 2020 Power Women. Abbie also continued her international research and partnerships to keep Mission Kids at the forefront of child advocacy centers.

True to our mission of "achieving healing and justice for victims of child abuse by providing collaborative services, advocacy, leadership and education," Mission Kids continued to strengthen forensic interviews, family advocacy and trauma therapy services for our most vulnerable children despite the pandemic. This was especially important as children experienced the societal and economic disruptions associated with COVID-19.


# Who We Are

Mission Kids provides a center for the team investigation of child abuse cases. Forensic interviews are conducted in a manner that is legally sound, neutral, fact-finding and coordinated to avoid repeated interviews and trauma to the child. Representatives of the District Attorney's Office, law enforcement and social services work together as a multidisciplinary team to observe, but not participate in the interview as it takes place, thereby reducing the number of interviews a child victim must undergo. This team approach supports and protects children throughout the legal process, preserving their physical and emotional well-being.

Mission Kids Family Advocates ensure that children and families get the support, education and resources they need to overcome the trauma of abuse for as long as they need assistance. Family Advocates play a crucial role in connecting clients with resources in the community to address various needs including domestic violence, housing, clothing, food and caregivers' mental health and medical needs.

# **2020 Facts and Figures**

Mission Kids conducted 455 forensic interviews of child victims.

Mission Kids served 471 children and their families with forensic interview or family advocacy services.

Family Advocates made 127 referrals to trauma therapists for children to ensure they received specialized mental health intervention.

Forensic Interviewers made 109 referrals to Children's Hospital of Philadelphia's Child Abuse Referral and Evaluation (CARE) Clinic following the child's forensic interview at Mission Kids. Staffed by a team of physicians, social workers and mental health clinicians, the CARE Clinic provides specialized medical assessment and treatment for suspected child abuse victims.

Family Advocates attended 44 court hearings with 142 children and family members following their forensic interviews.

Family Advocates had 2,960 direct client contacts which included phone calls, initial on-site meetings, accompaniment to medical appointments and other appointments relevant to their case to ensure the continuity of services to all our families served at Mission Kids.



Due to the pandemic, child advocacy centers across the country saw a sharp decrease in ChildLine reports. Similarly, here in Montgomery County, we saw about a 29% decrease in the number of child abuse investigations. During 2020, we interviewed 455 children and worked with 497 caregivers. About **30% of our child clients** identified some type of disability. Out of the 455 cases, **17% resulted in criminal** charges being filed. 13% of cases involving Office of Children and Youth were indicated or founded.



To understand what a Child Advocacy Center (CAC) is, you must understand what children face without one. Without a CAC, the child may end up having to tell the worst story of their life over and over again to doctors, police, lawyers, investigators, judges, teachers, etc. What is worse is that they may not get the help they need to heal once the investigation is over.

# **Our Approach**

Mission Kids provides a center for the team investigation of child abuse cases. Children are spared additional trauma through the investigative process once there is a suspicion of serious abuse. In Montgomery County, Mission Kids is referred all cases that involve allegations of serious physical child abuse, child sexual abuse and child witnesses to violent crime. In our child-friendly facility, Mission Kids works with our partners to provide the highest quality of interventions, which would allow for both protection and justice for the child. Through strong partnerships with law enforcement, Montgomery County District Attorney's Office, Montgomery County Office of Children and Youth, Children's Hospital of Philadelphia (CHOP) and mental health specialists, Mission Kids is here to help children and ensure a quick path to healing.



### **COVID-19 Impact & Response**

### **Mission Kids Responds to COVID-19**

On March 12, 2020, Governor Wolf declared Montgomery County the epicenter of the COVID-19 pandemic in Pennsylvania. At the time, Montgomery County had 13 of the 22 cases reported in the state. As schools and nonessential services closed, Mission Kids quickly requested that all staff pack their necessary items to work from home. By March 16, Mission Kids had distributed its first written Guidelines of Operation During COVID-19 Pandemic. Mission Kids regularly met with multidisciplinary team members to develop safe, virtual forensic interviewing techniques so we could continue to serve our clients and respond to child abuse allegations while ensuring staff, multidisciplinary team members, children and their families remained safe and healthy. Clients had access to therapy through telehealth platforms. Prevention Education Staff responded to a desire and need among staff for virtual training opportunities.

Mission Kids was prepared with a reserve fund as well as advanced and encrypted technology to allow all employees to work remotely.

As the pandemic persisted, Mission Kids CEO Abbie Newman, R.N., J.D., led discussions with child advocacy centers across Pennsylvania on Mission Kids' response to COVID-19. Mission Kids took the lead in Pennsylvania on developing protocols for how to continue operating safely, discuss safety planning, conduct virtual forensic interviews and telehealth therapy and work remotely with staff and directors across the state.

### **International Partnerships**

### Study Published with Israeli Researchers from **Hebrew University**

Mission Kids CEO Abbie Newman, R.N., J.D., worked with Israeli researchers from Hebrew University on a study of the

impact of COVID-19 on the multidisciplinary team response to intrafamilial child sexual abuse (IFCSA). The study, "How does COVID-19 impact intrafamilial child sexual abuse? Comparison analysis of reports by practitioners in Israel and the US," was published in Child Abuse & Neglect. The study compared the experiences of professionals working with IFCSA families in both Israel and the U.S. during the COVID-19 pandemic. The study revealed the unique set of challenges that a pandemic posed for families dealing with IFCSA.

Abbie Newman, R.N., J.D., presented the research results at the virtual international Haruv Israel Webinar.

### Partnership with the Bambino Life Foundation

Mission Kids partnered with the Bambino Life Foundation, a Ugandan non-profit organization promoting girls' education  $\delta$ empowerment, to develop and deliver two online trainings in Uganda. The first covered the child advocacy center response in the U.S., cultural differences between the U.S. and Uganda in acceptable physical discipline and recognition and response to child sexual abuse. For the second Mission Kids partnered with Colleen Lelli, Ph.D., of Cabrini University and the International Society for Prevention of Child Abuse and Neglect to discuss the intersection of child abuse and domestic violence and how women can recognize and react within their communities.

### **Global Advocacy**

Mission Kids CEO Abbie Newman, R.N., J.D., worked with Congresswoman Susan Wild (PA-D) to pass HR 230, expressing that the U.S. condemns all forms of violence against children globally, recognizes the harmful impacts of violence against children and advocates for the adoption of evidence-based strategies to combat violence against children around the world.

# Updates

### **New Program Director Joins Mission Kids**

Jane Kim joined Mission Kids in October 2020 as Program Director. Before joining Mission Kids, Jane was the Director of the Bucks County Child Advocacy Center. # **A MISSION KIDS HERO**

At fifteen years old, Isaac\* liked to play tennis at the nearby park and play in a band with his friends. However, Isaac's childhood quickly changed when he witnessed a violent crime committed against a family member. After witnessing the event, he was immediately referred to Mission Kids for a forensic interview.

When Isaac arrived at Mission Kids, his father was worried that he would not be able to afford services for his son without insurance. Mission Kids' Family Advocate reassured him that Isaac would be connected to the services he needed, regardless of the family's ability to pay. The Family Advocate connected Isaac to Mission Kids' onsite trauma therapist free of charge and navigated complex systems to access funding that would cover the funeral expenses related to the violent crime. Mission Kids' Family Advocate was also able to identify a free music camp in the community that Isaac could attend throughout the summer.

Isaac continues to regularly attend therapy with his father at Mission Kids which has helped restore his sense of safety. The therapist works with Isaac's father to help him recognize trauma-related symptoms, utilize skills for coping and co-regulation and provide a nurturing and safe response when Isaac shares thoughts, feelings and memories of trauma. Isaac even had the courage to testify in court knowing that his father, Family Advocate and therapist were supporting him every step of the way. Isaac is looking forward to attending summer camp, playing tennis and going on vacation with his family this summer.

Thank you for making it possible for Isaac to access services and supports he wouldn't otherwise have. It is because of your support that Isaac, and countless children like Isaac, can receive the services they need to begin their journey of healing.

### **Grants/Projects**

### **Trauma Focused Cognitive Behavioral Therapy Grant**


Mission Kids received a grant from the Pennsylvania Commission on Crime and Delinguency to train 50 therapists in Trauma Focused Cognitive Behavioral Therapy (TF-CBT). TF-CBT is an evidence-based treatment for children and adolescents, along with their caregivers, impacted by trauma. Research shows that TF-CBT successfully resolves a broad array of emotional and behavioral difficulties associated with single, multiple and complex trauma experiences. The official TF-CBT National Therapist Certification Program prepares clinicians to become certified in the TF-CBT treatment model. Mission Kids implemented this training with Dr. Kristen Briggs from Healing Journeys, LLC. The training increased the number of clinicians in the southeastern region of Pennsylvania who provide evidence-based treatment for victims/survivors of child abuse and their families.





# **Community Outreach**

Despite COVID-19, Mission Kids Prevention Education Team moved forward with Trauma-informed Classroom Workshops, ROAR and Darkness to Light trainings.

### **STOP Grant**

In 2020, Mission Kids completed the second and final year of a \$300,000 STOP Grant awarded by the Pennsylvania Commission on Crime and Delinquency.

Over the course of the grant, Mission Kids and its multidisciplinary partners collaborated to develop and finalize a Sex Trafficking Response Protocol for children, as well as a separate protocol for adults. These protocols are not only being utilized effectively in Montgomery County to respond to cases of trafficking, but they also serve as a model response for counties across the Commonwealth to replicate.

Furthermore, Mission Kids and partners created several identification and screening tools for first responders to utilize in the field, as well as posters to be displayed across the county to increase community awareness of the issue. To further equip professionals in the field, the team designed a comprehensive guide to trauma-informed service provision and local resources. Three disciplinespecific training curricula for victim and social service providers, law enforcement and prosecutors were also created and facilitated throughout the year. In 2020, approximately 300 professionals were trained on the best practices for identifying and responding to victims of trafficking and commercial sexual exploitation.

Montgomery County and Mission Kids are readily identified as experts in this field and provide training on the work accomplished through the STOP Grant at a statewide, national and international level.
