# Expanding Support for Children & Families

## Lightning Joins Our Team, Bringing Comfort and Courage

In 2024, Mission Kids welcomed a new beacon of hope to our team. Lightning is a golden retriever-labrador mix facility dog trained through Canine Partners for Life. Her arrival has brought light and comfort to the children and families we serve, offering a reassuring presence during some of their most difficult moments. Lightning plays an essential role in helping children feel safe and supported. After forensic interviews, she greets children with a wagging tail and a gentle nuzzle, providing a soft landing as they transition to the next steps in their healing journey. While caregivers meet with the Multidisciplinary Team (MDT), Lightning stays with the child, offering calm companionship that eases nerves and restores a sense of security.

During therapy sessions, Lightning's presence becomes even more impactful—whether sitting quietly beside a child, resting her paw on their lap, or offering comforting snuggles, she helps children navigate difficult emotions and find the courage to express their stories. Her quiet but powerful support reminds children that they are never alone, reinforcing the healing process. Beyond the children, Lightning's joyful spirit uplifts the Mission Kids team, providing emotional support to staff who work tirelessly to bring hope to those in need. Her unwavering presence is a reminder that even in the heaviest moments, light can break through, making every step forward a little easier. Lightning is more than a facility dog: Lightning remains a bright light for all who walk through our doors, bringing joy and reassurance when it's needed most.



## Empowering Caregivers Through "Smarter Parents" Program

The Smarter Parents program was created to help caregivers support their children in trauma-informed ways that promote safety, understanding, and well-being. Recognizing the challenges parents face when discussing sensitive topics like boundaries, personal safety, and digital risks, this program provides expert-led guidance tailored to children ages 2 to 12. Through interactive workshops, caregivers gain crucial insights into healthy sexual development, learning to recognize age-appropriate behaviors while identifying signs of potential concern. By fostering open and honest communication, parents can create a foundation of trust, ensuring their children feel safe to ask questions and express concerns without fear or shame.

In today's world, equipping children with knowledge and confidence is more important than ever, and Smarter Parents helps families navigate these conversations with empathy and effectiveness. Beyond communication strategies, the program also empowers caregivers with actionable steps to create secure environments both at home and online, reducing risks and protecting children from harm. By addressing these issues proactively, parents become their children's strongest advocates, shaping a future where every child grows up feeling safe, supported, and understood. This initiative reflects our commitment to strengthening families and communities by providing them with the tools they need to foster resilience, protect childhood innocence, and promote lifelong well-being.

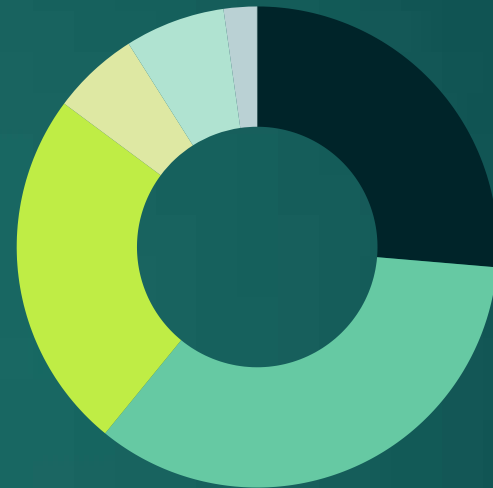

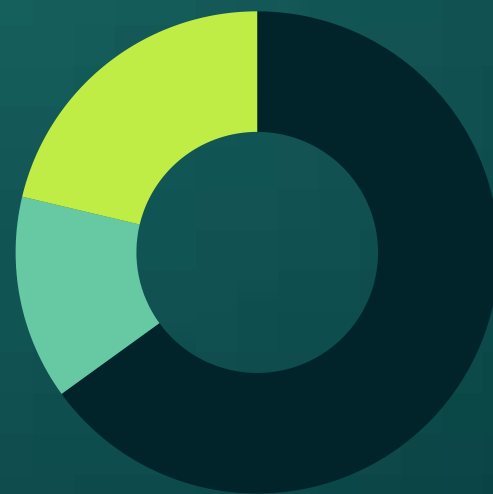

# Advancing Professional Expertise

## Bringing Child Protection Experts Together in Montgomery County

This year, we hosted a comprehensive training event that brought together 10 professionals from law enforcement, child protection, prosecution, mental health, medical services, victim advocacy, child advocacy centers, and social services. These experts led discussions on critical topics, including grooming, problematic sexualized behaviors in the digital age, juvenile sex offenses, and the increasing threats posed by artificial intelligence generated child sexual abuse material. Workshops examined the complexities of sextortion and image-based abuse, provided guidance on pediatric injury assessments, and explored cultural considerations in child protection. Through presentations such as *Randy & Me: A Prosecutor's Story of His Childhood Sexual Abuse*, participants gained firsthand insight into victim experiences, while *Grooming 101: A Predator's Playbook* illuminated the calculated tactics perpetrators use to exploit vulnerable children. Additionally, our *Promoting Safe Behaviors* program introduced attendees to collaborative approaches for supporting youth engaged in sexually acting out behaviors.

These efforts are essential not only for child protection professionals but also for the broader community. Ensuring that those on the front lines, including law enforcement, medical providers, advocates, and prosecutors, are equipped with the latest research and intervention strategies strengthens the collective ability to safeguard children. Sessions such as *Artificial Intelligence and Child Sexual Abuse Material* underscored the alarming reality of AI generated exploitation and the urgent need for legislative and preventative action, while workshops on sextortion, juvenile sex offense prosecution, and digital dynamics guided professionals in tackling emerging challenges with trauma-informed care. Experts from the Children's Hospital of Philadelphia provided invaluable training on assessing pediatric injuries, and discussions exploring Islamic perspectives helped foster culturally competent services for diverse communities. Recognizing the emotional toll of this work, we also introduced training on emotional regulation through the CE-CERT model, assisting professionals to maintain resilience in the field. By convening experts and advocates committed to protecting children, Mission Kids is not only improving individual responses to abuse but is strengthening the entire community, ensuring that children, caregivers, and service providers have the support, knowledge, and tools needed to create a safer future for all.



## Expanding Trauma-Informed Care Through EMDR

Twenty-two therapists seeking to enhance their ability to support children recovering from trauma participated in a specialized training hosted by Mission Kids in partnership with the Center for Excellence in EMDR Therapy. Eye Movement Desensitization and Reprocessing (EMDR) is an evidence-based therapy that helps individuals process and heal from distressing experiences by using bilateral stimulation, such as guided eye movements, to reframe traumatic memories. This intensive three-part, 46-hour program provided participants with a deep understanding of the adaptive information processing model and the eight-phase EMDR framework, guiding clients from trauma assessment through reprocessing and emotional recovery. Approved by EMDRIA, the gold standard for EMDR training worldwide, the program combined formal instruction, supervised practice sessions, and case consultation to ensure participants mastered the techniques necessary to support children in crisis. By offering this training, Mission Kids expanded the regional network of trauma-focused care, ensuring that children affected by abuse have access to skilled therapists and a clear path toward healing our weekly, group-based model, we empower both youth and caregivers with the tools they need to foster healing and prevention. With separate sessions for caregivers and impacted youth, spanning 18 to 22 weeks depending on progress, participants engage in trauma therapy, abuse prevention strategies, and social skill building that strengthens impulse control and decision-making abilities. We know that language shapes perception, which is why we use person-first language to reinforce the idea that a child is not defined by their behavior. They are capable of growth, change, and a brighter future. By tackling the root causes of these behaviors and creating a safe, supportive space for education and healing, Mission Kids is paving the way for a world where every child feels safe, supported, and heard.

# Community Engagement & Awareness

## Educating and Empowering Our Community to Protect Children

In 2024, Mission Kids reaffirmed its dedication to fostering an accessible and inclusive environment for all children and families through the expansion of our annual Pinwheels for Prevention ceremony. Held at the Norristown Transportation Center, this impactful event served as a public testament to our unwavering commitment to child abuse prevention. At the heart of the ceremony stood our symbolic pinwheel garden, planted with 1,326 pinwheels, each representing a child served by Mission Kids in the past year. To amplify our message and reach a broader audience, we placed two large billboards directly above the pinwheel garden at the DeKalb Pike entrance, ensuring that thousands of daily commuters, traveling by car and on the transit line, were met with a powerful visual statement of hope and awareness. One billboard displayed our message in English, while the other shared it in Spanish, a deliberate and meaningful effort to strengthen our connection with Norristown's Spanish-speaking community.

By embracing bilingual communication in such a visible and public manner, Mission Kids reinforced that we are here, we are listening, and we are a safe space for all. The pinwheel garden remained on display for the entire month of April, serving as a lasting reminder that child abuse is preventable when communities stand together. Through this initiative, Mission Kids demonstrated its commitment to ensuring that every child and family, regardless of language, background, or circumstance, feels seen, heard, and supported. By creating a space where our message is both accessible and inclusive, we continue to strengthen trust, broaden awareness, and build a safer future for all children in our community.

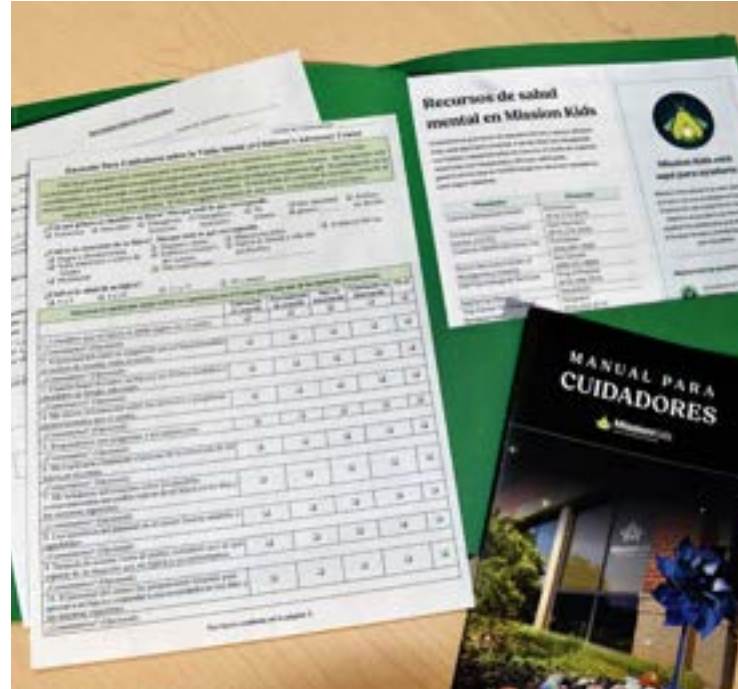


# Fueling Innovation & Access

## Expanding Access for Spanish-Speaking Families: Enhancing Bilingual Advocacy

Mission Kids received \$100,000 in funding from the Pennsylvania Commission on Crime and Delinquency (PCCD), supported by Act I of 2013 (Endowment Act), to strengthen support for Spanish-speaking families in Montgomery County. This grant funded the hiring of a full-time bilingual Spanish-speaking Family Advocate, ensuring that families receive trauma-informed advocacy, case coordination, and resource navigation in their native language.

The advocate works across disciplines to support families during sensitive interviews, medical evaluations, and therapeutic processes—eliminating barriers tied to language and cultural understanding. Additionally, the advocate conducts outreach with local Latino communities to raise awareness of available services and foster trust with families who may be unfamiliar with the child advocacy process. Internally, they assist in translating key prevention and response materials, expanding access to resources for limited-English-proficient clients. This investment reflects Mission Kids' broader mission to provide equitable, accessible care for every child and family in our community.



## Byrne-JAG Community Project Grant: Equipping a Regional Hub for Justice and Healing

Mission Kids was honored to receive a \$1,000,000 Byrne Discretionary Grant through the federal Byrne-JAG Community Project initiative. This vital funding will be used to acquire state-of-the-art equipment and furnishings for our future Regional Training Facility and Child Advocacy Center. The facility is designed to significantly advance the investigations and prosecutions of child abuse cases by offering immersive, high-quality training and professional development for multidisciplinary teams—including police officers, prosecutors, victim advocates, and child protection professionals.

Rather than constructing a new building or significantly renovating a facility, the grant supports internal infrastructure improvements that align with environmental and historical preservation guidelines. The training center will serve child abuse responders throughout Pennsylvania and the Northeast/Mid-Atlantic region, ultimately strengthening community health and safety and positioning Pennsylvania as a national leader in child protection response.



## Increasing Engagement in Mental Health Services: Supporting Survivors Through Coordinated Care

Mission Kids received \$50,000 through the East PA P124 National Children's Alliance Program Improvement Grant to launch a new initiative: "Increasing Engagement into Mental Health Services for Victims and Families." This transformative effort is designed to remove access barriers and improve long-term outcomes for child abuse victims in Montgomery County by bolstering their engagement with evidence-based trauma treatment.

At the heart of the project is the creation of a new full-time Mental Health Outcome Coordinator position. This specialist will work closely with advocates, caregivers, service providers, and mental health professionals to ensure that children referred for treatment receive consistent, compassionate support every step of the way. The coordinator will also track and analyze engagement data to identify systemic gaps, enhance provider collaboration, and expand the network of trauma-informed therapists linked to Mission Kids.

The project is expected to increase engagement and successful completion of mental health services, reduce trauma symptoms, and establish best practices that can be shared with partner organizations to support more families statewide. This initiative exemplifies Mission Kids' commitment to breaking down barriers and bringing healing within reach for every child who walks through our doors.



# Global Advocacy and Policy Impact

## Advancing Child Protection Worldwide: A Framework for Vulnerable Communities

In 2024, Mission Kids unveiled the Collaborative Response Framework for Child Protection in Vulnerable Communities at the International Society for the Prevention of Child Abuse and Neglect (ISPCAN) Congress in Uppsala, Sweden. Developed under the leadership of Abbie Newman, CEO of External and Global Affairs, this trauma-informed model provides a blueprint for building multidisciplinary systems that protect children from sexual abuse in resource-limited settings. Rooted in the Child Advocacy Center (CAC) approach, the framework emphasizes collaboration, cultural responsiveness, and community-driven solutions that can be adapted across diverse global contexts.

Following its launch, Mission Kids introduced the framework through a global webinar with more than 600 professionals and began the first pilot in an Arab community in Israel. By working hand-in-hand with local leaders to adapt the model in culturally sensitive ways, Mission Kids is paving the way for international partners to strengthen child protection practices. This initiative reflects our belief that while abuse is a global issue, solutions must be tailored to each community. Through education, collaboration, and research-driven innovation, Mission Kids is helping vulnerable children worldwide find safety, healing, and hope.

Mission Kids is proud to announce the purchase of a 37,000-square-foot building in Plymouth Meeting, a transformative step forward in our mission to protect and heal children impacted by abuse. This facility will serve as the future home of our expanded Child Advocacy Center and a first-of-its-kind Regional Training Center, purposefully designed to meet the growing needs of the children, families, and professionals we serve. The space will include on-site medical exam rooms to provide compassionate, trauma-informed care in a safe and familiar setting, as well as three individual therapy rooms, dedicated group therapy spaces, and an art therapy room to support a wide range of emotional and developmental needs.

To strengthen our training efforts, the building will feature a fully equipped mock courtroom and mock apartment, allowing professionals to practice and refine their skills in realistic environments that mirror the situations children face. Co-location space for our multidisciplinary partners will foster stronger collaboration and more seamless care for families. This new home reflects our vision for a comprehensive, healing-centered environment where children feel safe, professionals are empowered, and communities come together to ensure that no child walks their journey alone.
